"Thank you" does not paymuch, but each of us know that we were part of a very successful four thannual all-state experience which money cannot purchase anyway!



audition hosts and their army of assistants, parents and students who ran the auditions. It took all of us to make it work - and make it work we did! As glorious as the past has been, our future looks just as bright. Our 1996 clinician will be Dr. Robert Foster from the University of Kansas (we have also commissioned Dr. Foster to compose a grade 3+ work for the 1996 All-State Band). The 1997 clinician will be Dr. Tim Lautzenheizer (the nationally recognized motivational expert and gifted musician). In the works: we have sent a contract to Ed Huckeby to be our 1998 clinician (we have also sent Mr. Huckeby a contract commissioning him to compose a grade 3+ work for the 1998 All-State Band); we have sent a contract to John O'Reilly to be our 1999 clinician (we have also sent Mr. O'Reilly a contract commissioning him to compose a grade 3+ work for the 1999 All-State Band). So you can see that we have many fine years ahead of us! If you can think of an appropriate clinician for the year 2000, please let us know.

#### Interesting facts about the All-State Band in general:

Over the last four years, 4 made it as freshmen, missed it their sophomore year, then made it once again as a junior. 3 made it their freshman and sophomore year, then missed it their junior year. 14 made it as freshmen and sophomores. 7 made it as sophomores, missed it as juniors, then made it as seniors. 7 made it their sophomore and junior years, then missed it as seniors. 14 made it as sophomores, juniors, then as seniors. 37 made it as juniors and seniors.

John Hoover of Educational Recording Service has gone to considerable trouble and personal expense to

# *Interesting facts about the 1995 All-State Band:* The band had 65 females and 58 males.

by the number of people in the room. This is a good contract in that it does not progressively increase the rate for increased numbers in the room. However, it does not include the full American breakfast we have been used to receiving in the past. If you stop and think about it, if all four students in the room used their breakfast tickets in a \$100 room, the amount for the room dropped to \$68! This is why when Ramada Inn bought out the Emily Morgan they looked very closely at our bookings. Their original room rate went as high as \$128 per room, so I feel like we got the best rate we could. This contract also keeps Ramada Inn from raising the room rate more than 5% each year.

Interesting facts about the 1995 All-State Band: Of the

123 members, each of the 20 regions had an average of 6.15 students in the band. One region had 12 (the most) and one region had none (the least). Each of the five Areas had an average of 24.6 in the band. Area A had 22, Area B had 25, Area C had 27, Area D had 25, and Area E had 24.
