Several events in the past few weeks have provided the opportunity to consider the blessings of a twenty-eight-year teaching career in small school bands. Be sure when you go to Area that all forms are properly signed and completed - and that after Area you make reservations for your students that were selected for the All-State Bands - and also that you have housing plans yourself.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Sherry Poteet and Darin Jolly for their two years of service to ATSSB as Class C/CC and Class AA Representatives to the State Board of Directors. It is a time-consuming but necessary role that they played as the Executive Committee of which they are a part has tried to accommodate the needs of students and their directors over the past two years. I would also like to thank George Strickland for his

leadership, guidance, counsel, and friendship as he completes four years of service to ATSSB and moves on to other things as Immediate Past President. Most people do not realize the six-year commitment he has made to serving ATSSB. It is a thankless task, but one he has served well. He has worked very hard to keep ATSSB at the front edge of professionalism in everything associated with its activities. Thank you, lady and gentlemen, for your dedication to small schools in Texas with your service.

Our 4-Year All-State Band Scholarship Fund stands at \$31,481.98. This increase is from the 169 members who joined after October 1 paying an additional \$25 in dues which went into this fund and from royalties paid by our Licensees. etc.; Probst Audio (Scott Probst - Ennis) = recordings of concerts on tape or CD; Concertronics (William Collins - Victoria) = recording of concerts on tape or CD; Jordan Sound Productions (Gary Jordan - Bullard) = recording of concerts on tapes or CD and ATSSB Area etude performance tapes; Made To Order (Larry Wood - Lorenzo) = T-shirts, caps, plaques, etc.; California T's (L. Steve Taylor - Lubbock) = T-shirts, caps, plaques, etc.; Rehearsal Solutions (Robert McElroy - Bellville) = ATSSB Area etude performance sequence files.

A reminder about piccolo and Eb clarinet: If your flute or clarinet player makes the All-State Band at the Area auditions January 8 and would like to play piccolo (flutes) or Eb Soprano Clarinet (clarinets), have them bring their piccs/effers to San Antonio. After regular chair auditions are completed for flute/clarinet, we will hold separate auditions for these two instruments for each band from among those students interested in it that were selected for their respective bands. One piccolo and one soprano clarinet may be selected from among the Symphonic flutes and clarinets; also, one piccolo and one soprano clarinet may be selected from among the Concert flutes and clarinets. If no one auditions on these instruments from one, either, or both bands, then the instrument will not be used. A notice concerning this policy will be placed in the flute and clarinet packets they will receive at Area this year if they are selected for the All-State Band.

We will continue our **hotel reservation practice**. Each student that wishes to stay in ATSSB housing must pay a \$100 housing fee directly to ATSSB (the address will be on the housing form they complete at Area). ATSSB will then pay one check for the hotel rooms up front. If directors are able to reserve a room using ATSSB housing forms, they must pay for the room in one check directly to ATSSB in the amount of \$333 (split any way you can among directors sharing the room with you). Make sure you include the student name and school (or director's name and school). Remember to take care of this before January 27 or you will lose your reservation.

We plan to hold our **ATSSB Business Session** in the Scottish Rite Auditorium at 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, February 8. Elections for President-Elect and Class C/CC and Class AA Representatives to the State Board of Directors will be held at this meeting. I hope you can make plans to attand during the busy activities in San Antonio at that time of year to attend. Remember that proxies are not allowed in these elections. A short biographical sketch of each candidate for state office can be found in this Newsletter beginning on page 6.

When you get a chance, be sure to thank our Region and Area Coordinators for their efforts in securing audition sites, hosts, audition chairmen, computer equipment and logistics, etc. Also, let's not forget to thank our State Chair Audition Coordinator (Scott Stephenson of Ballinger), State Chair Audition Office Manager (Louis Thornton of Abilene Christian High School), and all of their helpers and judging panels in advance of the work facing them as the two bands are seated. Our All-State Symphonic Band Organizer (Mike Lewis of Burnet), All-State Percussion Organizer (Chris McLellan of Glen Rose), and All-State Concert Band Organizer (Darin Jolly of Coleman) still have a job ahead of them. The convention-clinic and concerts will take a LOT of preparation, advanced planning and organization. Rooms have been booked for you and your students, the Scottish Rite Auditorium has been reserved and liability insurance purchased for the time we will occupy it. Arrangements for police security in the auditorium have been made, stands and percussion equipment have to be provided before chair auditions begin on Wednesday night, programs have to be completed, badges for the students have to be made and personalized, entertainment for All-State students prior to the general meeting arranged -- not to mention many other activities taking place in the background as we prepare for the clinic. All of the people involved give so much of their time to make it a success. It would not be possible if it weren't for their dedication to the profession and the students in the All-State Bands who benefit from their efforts.

Since this will be our last communication before San Antonio, let me address those of you who will have students in the All-State Band. Please remember that many are in the "big city" for the first time. They will need frequent contact with you to allay their fears and keep them focused on their role as they represent not only ATSSB, but also their home bands, school, and community. Drop by rehearsals often, especially at breaks, to see that they have a place to go and that they know what they may do in their free time. It also helps to have directors observing rehearsals at all times. Not only do we learn good rehearsal techniques from our fine clinicians, but also we can act as a restraining presence to students who might otherwise allow their attention to drift during rehearsals. There is certainly nothing wrong with leaning over a student with a cap on and quietly asking him or her to remove it -- or watching a section and noticing a student talking in a distracting manner and quietly asking them to stop. Our Organizers are with the band almost constantly, but we cannot expect them to be there every minute nor expect them to see every infraction of rehearsal protocol. Try to drop by and give a listen -- and a hand.

Our corporate supporters are so consistent in their desire to help. Caldwell Music has provided our All-State programs every year since inception. This is a considerable expense, but they are quick to reply that they would like to continue to provide this service when asked. Fruhauf Uniforms also is continuing to provide the All-State shoulder patch each year. Pender's Music Company is the source from which we purchase our All-State music (at a discount, I might add); they also copy and collate the Area folders and State Chair Audition judges' folders. Bill McMath and Richard Gore are gracious in their help and professional in their service. Several fund-raiser companies provide refreshments for the students during their breaks and some companies provide "survival kits" at times (coupons, pencils, notebooks, etc.); they will be recognized along with Caldwell Music, Fruhauf Uniforms, and Pender's Music in the programs. I just wanted to say an additional "Thank You" to these three for their contributions to the continued success of the ATSSB All-State Band.

The new 2001 OPS packets will be given to the ATSSB State Board members at the State Board meeting on Thursday, February 8. Every Region Coordinator is asked to copy and mail in early March all pertinent information to every director in his/her region. Any director who does not receive entry forms by March 15, 2001, should contact his/her Region Coordinator. Any director who enters must have entry forms postmarked on or before May 20. Look for more information in the March Newsletter.

Please remember that all recordings for the 2001 Outstanding Performance Series will be on compact disc. Cassette tapes will not be accepted! If you enter one song, you must submit two CDs. If you enter three songs, you must submit six CDs with one song only on each CD! Any CD that will not play on the CD player provided by the Designated Region Coordinator, or the official in charge, at any level of competition will be disqualified. It is the responsibility of the director to be absolutely sure that each CD will play in virtually any type of CD player. It is strongly recommended that you have the CDs professionally made. Beware of CD writers that come with computers! Some CD players will not read CDs made on computers. Be sure you play the CDs that someone makes for you before they are entered, and allow plenty of time to have them made again, if necessary. Look for more instructions about the CDs in the March Newsletter.

We have just finished the fourth year of the Outstanding Performance Series. It does not seem possible. I have said before, and I must say again, that this program has been so successful because of the leadership, dedication, and commitment made by the Region and Area Coordinators, and because of the numerous directors that have given their time to serve as judges at the Region, Area, and State levels. Without their help, the Outstanding Performance Series would not be possible. I thank all of you for your tremendous support. I am looking forward to the 2001 OPS.

ELECTION

President-Elect and Class C/CC and Class AA Representatives to the State Board of Directors for 2001-03 will be elected in the ATSSB General Session on Thursday, February 8, 2010 at 11:30 a.m. in the Scottish Rite Auditorium. Biographies of the nominees follow on page 6. All Active members may vote for President-Elect, but members may only vote on the candidates for the class schools in which they are actively involved. For example, if a member is at a class AA high school, then he or she may only vote for the class AA Representative. Directors at C/CC may vote for the Class AA Representative if their school feeds a Class AA school. Class AAA and C/CC schools that feed A or AAA high schools may only vote for President-Elect.

Mr. Lowes was recognized for leadership and positively influencing the character of hundreds of young people while taking part in various church and civic activities by the La Grange Rotary Club. He



is the recipient of the 1996-97 UIL Denius Sponsor Excellence Award by La Grange High School. The high school bands at La Grange have recently earned superior first division ratings eight out of the last nine years, earned 8 Sweepstakes Awards, advanced to the area marching finals 5 times and placed in the top three positions at the Blinn College Marching Festival for the past ten years. His 1998 concert band placed 3rd at TMEA area honor band competitions. His concert bands have also placed in the ATSSB Outstanding Performance Series. He has served at numerous TMAA concert band-judging events in the State of Texas.

Mr. Lowes has served Region XVIII as band division secretary, A, 2A, 3A UIL organizer, TMEA region band organizer from the early 80's and continued as ATSSB region coordinator and area central coordinator. He has assisted in selecting and acquiring all the UIL marching, concert & sight-reading judges for Class C/CC/A/AA/AAA bands in region eighteen as well as all the clinicians for the middle school and high school region bands. Under his sponsorship, the region bands have had nationally known composers and conductors.

Mr. Lowes's wife, Ann was the assistant band director at La Grange High School for twenty years and currently assists at Bastrop ISD. She is currently

the region eighteen-band division secretary. Ed and his wife Ann have been married for twenty-seven years and have four children. Harold is a trombone music major at Southwest Texas State University. 
won many awards including four consecutive first division ratings at UIL Solo& Ensemble and three

Not present were Founding Charter Member Mike Bendiksen, Founding Charter Member Lonnie Dooley, and Founding Charter Member Fred Pankratz.

As the Board and invited guests were enjoying a buffet breakfast, President George Strickland called the meeting to order at 7:17 a.m. and asked Ronnie Page to give the invocation.

The oath of office was administered by Executive Secretary Kenneth Griffin.

The minutes of the SBOD meeting February 10, 2000 were approved as printed in the March Newsletter after a motion by John Odom and a second by James Marioneaux.

The Presidential appointment of Rodney Bennett to fill the unexpired term of Class A Representative was approved after a motion by Jennifer Willison and a second by Mike Marsh.

Sherry Poteet thanked her committee studying private middle school participation in ATSSB activities: Daniel Aleman, Fred Angerstein, Stacy Gist, and Mike Marsh. Her committee moved to allow all private school students to participate in ATSSB auditions regardless of the size of the high school they are to attend the following year so long as the total enrollment of the middle school does not exceed UIL C/CC standards. Virgil Beene seconded the motion. After a lengthy debate, the question was called and the motion passed. Mr. Strickland noted that this change will require a constitutional amendment which will be presented to the general membership for consideration at the February General Session.

Ms. Poteet reported that the committee she chairs looking into a Suggested Audition List for middle schools would have a report for the SBOD by February. This list would be provided as a guide for regions to use for middle school region band auditions and would not be a required list. Regions would be free to use the suggested etudes, cuts from them, or not use them at their discretion

Chris Lovejoy's committee studying homeschooler participation in ATSSB included David Stamp, Michael Cropland and Elmer Schenk. They moved that homeschoolers may participate in ATSSB activities so long as the student's parents or private teacher is a member of ATSSB and TMEA and accepts responsibility for the student's entry and eligibility requirements. Greg Miller seconded and a lively debate ensued. After a lengthy debate, the question was called and a vote taken. Motion failed.

Gary Robbins then gave a report on the SARC. He noted that there were two errata reported to him that were approved by The committee: The Gatti etude for trumpet, trombone, baritone, and tuba for Year E: measure 26, second note should be a concert F. Also Year E Percussion I should read p. 9, #VII.

Don Thoede, OPS State Chair, thanked all Region and Area Coordinators for their help with this year's OPS and announced the respective OPS winners and runners-up. His committee made the following recommendations:

Beginning in the spring of 2001, directors will submit CDs, not cassette tapes, for competition. Example: If a director wants to enter all three songs, he/she must submit a total of 6 CDs (one song on each CD). Motion was made by Jennifer Willison, seconded by Don Stockton. Motion carried.

The "Procedure" section of the OPS guidelines states: "Any class C or CC middle school, A, AA, or AAA high school band may enter a tape provided the Head Director is a current regular member of ATSSB". Change it to read: "Any class C or CC middle school, A, AA, or AAA high school band may enter a CD provided the band director of the school entering is a current regular member of ATSSB. Motion was made by Kenneth Griffin, seconded by Virgil Beene. Motion carried.

Continue to use Crystal Clear Sound, Dallas, Texas, for production of OPS CDs. Motion was made by Ronnie Page, seconded by Rodney Bennett. Motion carried.

Mr. Thoede asked entering directors, Region, Designated Region and Designated Area Coordinators to carefully read and follow all guidelines and entry deadlines.

In the President's report, George Strickland read a letter from TMEA Band Division Vice-President Jeff Laird thanking ATSSB for an invitation to the SBOD meeting, but expressed regrets that he had a prior commitment. Mr. Strickland also noted that at the TMEA Region Band Chair meeting, there was open a agreeable dialogue between TMEA and ATSSB at all times. He

urged everyone to attend the ATSSB-sponsored clinic with Bill Biskup entitled "Crisis Recovery in the Band Room". He noted that this year will mark the tenth anniversary of ATSSB's beginnings and he had invited John Gibson (ATSSB Founder) to conduct the Star-Spangled Banner. Other activities are being planned and would be announced as they are finalized.

In the Executive Secretary's report, Kenneth Griffin noted that the original printing of the Prescribed Audition List had been distributed and a new printing had been completed which incorporates all known errata. He noted that the packet of audition forms were sent to home addresses but all forms were now available on-line in pdf format. He asked Region Coordinators to turn in their patch orders before September 15. He went over the packet items and asked for input regarding former SBOD members so he could verify archival data. He reported that the Executive Committee had approved selling the PAL to members requesting replacement for \$5 to cover the cost of printing and mailing, but that PALs would continue to be given to new directors and current members on request if they have moved to a new school.

Under Old Business:

Ronnie Page reported that the Past-President Committee met and moved as a committee that we create a College Division membership to encourage instrumental music education majors who are enrolled in a college/university music program and to inform them of the rewards of working in a small school band program. Dues would be \$10 per student, per year. Benefits for students would include an ATSSB College Division Membership Card, a subscription to the ATSSB Newsletter, a listing of availability for judging ATSSB auditions, and a listing for availability to teach private lessons. The motion was seconded by Virgil Beene. Motion carried. Mr. Strickland noted that this would require a constitutional amendment that would be presented to the membership for consideration in February.

Mr. Page announced that his committee had also selected Overton High School, Glen Wells, Director, as the subject for the recruitment video that is going to be filmed in 2000-01.

Scott Stephenson reported that the Music Education Camp at Angelo State University did not make again due to lack of prior advertisement of the camp's availability and that they were going to give it one more try with better publicity. Ronnie Page asked how many regions would sponsor one or two students to this type of camp and about eight immediately responded affirmatively.

Under New Business:

Lonnie Baker moved and Virgil Beene seconded that the board make the motion in the General Session to accept the proposed constitutional amendments being presented. The motion passed unanimously.

The bid for recording the All-State concerts from Probst Audio was accepted after a motion by Ronnie Page and a second by James Nance. James Nance moved and Ronnie Page seconded that we accept Probst's suggestion that no cassette tapes would be offered, only CDs. Motion carried

Jennifer Willison moved and Sandy Brown seconded that we accept the proposal from Pender's Music Company to provide copying services and discounted music for Area packets and All-State Band music. The motion passed unanimously.

It was decided by straw vote to invite James Barnes to be the 2003 Concert Band clinician and to commission Mr. Barnes to write a piece for the 2003 Concert Band.

Mr. Griffin asked if he could give the finance report once a year in February which would encompass the fiscal year (September 1-August 31) so it would be easier to see annual expenditures and income. The board agreed that would be acceptable.

Kenneth Griffin moved that the Past President Committee be a standing committee responsible for recruitment, mentoring, and member welfare. After a second by Don Stockton, the motion carried. Mr. Strickland noted that this would require a constitutional amendment which would be presented to the membership in February.

Mr. Griffin noted that we could possibly accept Visa and Mastercard on-line or over the telephone, but it would cost 83 cents per \$25 membership. Scott Stephenson moved and Virgil Beene seconded that we make application and use the service for a year to see if it is beneficial to the membership.

Don Stockton moved and Ronnie Page seconded that we accept Avant Recordings' recommendation to charge \$15 for the 2000 OPS 2-CD set with \$5 of each sale going into the Scholarship Fund. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Griffin asked if we should continue the student survey and the consensus was that it should be continued with additional information requested. He asked for input regarding the makeup of the survey.

Mr. Strickland announced that the region realignment was going forward and that members should be encouraged to keep an eye on the UIL and TMEA websites to see that their schools are ending up where they wished. Rodney Bennett noted that in whatever region schools participated in 2000-01 is where they will be for the new realignment in 2001-02 because he was told that there would be no transfers allowed for the first year of the new realignment. Mr. Strickland also announced that the small school state marching contest would be held in Waco this year.

Daniel Aleman asked if any regions gave scholarships to their seniors who made the All-State Band. Several regions replied in the affirmative and he asked to see them after the meeting.

George Strickland thanked Don Thoede for all his work and contributions to the OPS process.

Accepted the bid of Crystal Clear Sound to produce the 1999 OPS CDs.

Accepted the bid of Omni Video to produce and sell videotapes of the All-State concerts.

Agreed to price the 2000 2-CD set of OPS CDs at \$15 with \$5 of each sale to go to the Scholarship Fund.

Selected Pender's Music Company to supply copies, packets, and from whom we would purchase the All-State music.

Voted to make the Past President Committee a standing committee. This will require a constitutional amendment.

Voted to accept MC and VISA on-line and by mail and telephone on a trial basis for a year.

Under new business, the set of constitutional amendments were presented to the membership as a motion for acceptance from the SBOD. After a second by Florencio Lara from Lytle High School, the motion passed.



Letter to the Editor

As I put fingers to computer keyboard to begin this letter, it is difficult to accept that it has been ten years since that eventful and emotional vote in the band division of TMEA when the proposal to implement a small school all-state band was defeated. The meeting which was usually held in the Fiesta rooms of the convention center with modest attendance was moved to the Lila Cockrell Theatre to accommodate the huge crowd that showed up, many only to cast a vote. In fact, I sat next to a longtime friend and colleague who I still respect to this day who told me up front that he was there only to vote against the small school proposition. There are those in the profession today who still feel strongly that the vote went the right way and that the purity of the all-state process has been diluted.

At that meeting, which was full of confusion and controversy, there were several small school directors who voiced the thoughts which most of us accepted as our own. There was a real need for an all-state organization made up of small school band students. The previous attempts to bring about such a performing group had been ignored, conveniently lost in the "idea box" or just outright not taken seriously. The

competition statewide was staggering and the small, mostly country school students were not on a "level playing field" with the urban students due to the accessibility of private lessons and the huge staffs of the bigger schools. When TMEA was first organized and the first all-state band came into being, the opportunities of all students was about the same. Nearly all bands whether in the urban areas or small towns had one director. Budgets, quality of instruments, and many other factors were equal. The directors who attended those early conventions brought their "best" students to form the all-state ensembles. They took a risk to enrich the lives of their students and we owe them a tremendous debt of gratitude.

In the ensuing years the process had evolved into a cutthroat competition with lawsuits, hard feelings, pain and mental anguish. While the experience for the students who were selected to perform at convention was great, the groups were constantly composed of mostly students from the urban schools with only a handful from 1A, 2A, or 3A. Not only were private lessons a must, but "which teacher" sometimes determined whether the student was interpreting the music in the correct way and therefore selected. My best students, who took privately and practiced diligently, were no match as were most of the other small school students. One of my flute players, a wonderful and talented girl, had a gold lip plate, which bore the shape of her bottom lip from the many hours of practice. The closest she ever came was 5 chairs below the cutoff.

When that TMEA meeting ended and we all went back to our schools to continue the "status quo", it dawned on me that there were several hundred directors who had voted for a small school band and that if we could organize with only 100 of them, we could make a go of it. I got on the phone, sent letters and took the chance and set up a meeting in Abilene. Thanks to Louis Thornton for letting us use his band hall even though he had some serious reservations about what I had planned at the time. In attendance were 15 directors from across the state who made the trip at their own expense and at the risk of being branded as troublemakers, who listened to my proposals, asked the right questions, added ideas from their own experience and ATSSB was born. Some had boosters donate and some paid right out of their own pockets \$100 each as operating capital to get the word out, design and print membership forms, and any of a multitude of needs to get started.

Officers were elected: Mike Marsh-president, Fred Pankratz-vice president and Kenneth Griffin-executive secretary. Those three men put their well respected names and reputations on the line and went out and (with the help of those other 12) did the legwork to secure a place to rehearse and lodging for the first ATSSB all-state band, as well as the other details necessary for TEA accreditation. We owe them all a huge thank you and our undying respect for keeping a professional demeanor in the face of obstacles most of us would find impossible to overcome. It is my strong conviction that they are the real heroes in this story. They had help from many others, but Mike, Fred and Kenneth made ATSSB a reality.

In the ten years since then, ATSSB has touched the lives of so many students. Many ideas ATSSB used, some out of necessity, some out of the sheer brilliance of the membership, have found their way into the "status quo" of TMEA. Two that come to mind are the Prescribed List of books for all-state etudes and the taping process now used in the 4A TMEA auditions. I challenge you all to keep the spirit of those early days in mind when you work to make ATSSB a stronger organization. Keep an open mind when discussing policies and needs of the group statewide. ATSSB was founded on the idea that small school directors know what is best for students in the small schools and that each of us has something useful to donate to the cause. I will always have you in my thoughts as you prepare those wonderful students in your bands for life as doctors, manual laborers, lawyers, nurses, teachers, engineers, short order cooks, construction workers, farmers, school board members, parents and voters in the real world. Can you think of a nobler calling?
