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

Executive Secretary's Column

What an incredible year! Since March of 2020 (when my school let out for Spring Break, we had three contest tunes prepared to go right after Spring Break, then the bottom fell out!), we have seen a plethora of techniques to try to keep our students involved and progressing on their instruments. Virtual band just did not cut it for me! I did the usual things like playoffs using FlipGrid, assigning scales and playoffs to keep them actively engaged, but it could never substitute for in-person band! When we started school this past fall, we had to move our 65 students from a cramped band hall to the Cafetorium (students were fed lunch in their homerooms) where we spread out 6 feet apart. True, balance, blend, tuning, precision all went out the doors (actually never came in!), but we actually got a lot of things accomplished during the year, giving four

performances (virtually video recorded and posted with a link for parents and friends) in addition to entering a festival virtually. Hopefully, this next fall, we can have a "normal" year of band!

Make sure you put June 9-12, 2021 on you calendar. You need to try your best to make the ATSSB All-State Band Clinic and Concert if at all possible. At least come on Friday for the ATSSB 30th Anniversary Luncheon in the Sheraton McKinney Throckmorton Ballroom at 1:00. Door prizes include gift cards of \$25, \$50, \$100 and \$250! ATSSB Founder John Gibson will give opening remarks and ATSSB Past-President George Strickland will be our keynote speaker. You may order tickets ahead of time by clicking HERE, or you can pay \$15 at the door. The luncheon is sponsored in part by Kaleidoscope Adventures, Inc. We appreciate Kaleidoscope Adventures, Inc. for their support. They also donated director badge holders and lanyards. Jerry Whorton and his staff at Melissa have done an amazing job planning and providing the wonderful facilities for our use. We appreciate Melissa ISD Superintendent Keith Murphy, Melissa High School Principal Kenneth Wooten, Fine Arts Director Jerry Whorton, and the entire Melissa Band staff for their contributions to the success of this clinic. I hope to see you there!

Your membership expires on July 31 so if you plan to enter students into jazz auditions which are always early, be sure to join for 2021-2022 as soon as you can to avoid errors while entering students. If you are not yet a member for next year, fill out the application online HERE. You need only list name and school and any changes - we already have the other posted data in the database. Then send payment when your school budget year begins - or go ahead and send in the check or school Purchase Order now while you are thinking about it. Dues for Active Members are \$50, but remember that after October 1, the dues increase to \$75 unless you are joining as an Associate Member or College Division Member (everything is the same, you just cannot run for office, vote, or enter students in any ATSSB competition). Retirees who retire as an Active Member retain their Active Membership but dues are reduced to \$25 per year. A cover page showing your ATSSB and TMEA membership card must be sent with the initial entry forms for the first audition entered (ATSSB or TMEA). Don't forget that if you enter students in the Jazz Ensemble competitions that audition deadlines are EARLY, so get your ATSSB and TMEA dues taken care of as soon as possible. I email a copy of your card as soon as I receive payment of dues, so be sure we have an accurate email address for you and that your school does not block mail from this office (attachments trigger spam guards, so make sure we are allowed). While you are at it, go ahead and join TBA so we can see you there, too!

You may have noticed that we have a new secure website. If you are having difficulty finding forms or data you need, you can always check out the link at the top of the home page "ATSSB A-Z" which can help you find what you are looking for. If you have suggestions on how we can improve the site's usefulness, send it to our Webmaster, Marc Nichelson (mnichelson@atssb.org). Also let us know if any links are not working or are out of date.

In your fall region meetings, you need to nominate a Class 2C Representative, a Class 4A Representative, and a Class 1A/2A Representative to the State Board of Directors. The election will be held at the General Session tentatively scheduled for Friday, February 11, 2021, at 1:00 p.m. in Room 206 of the Convention Center. After nominees have accepted their nominations, their pictures and biographies (if submitted) will appear in the online December Newsletter, so keep an eye out for that issue. Please get involved in the district, region, and area activities of ATSSB - and seek state office if you would like to serve at that level. It is a lot of work, requires a lot of time and effort, and entails constant contact with fellow officers, but the end results are very worthwhile (and obviously beneficial to our students and ATSSB in general).

The Prescribed Audition List Update (Use Year A) is now available online (click <u>HERE</u>).

The September Newsletter is no longer mailed. We used to mail it to include a copy of the OPS winners CD as a reference tool for our directors. Of course, last year we had no OPS competition due to the corona virus pandemic. Future OPS winners will be distributed via a Permanent Digital Download (PDD). All Newsletters are now available online as a pdf file.

This coming year for the 2022 All-State Clinic, Dr. Emily Threinen, University of Minnesota, will be the clinician for the Symphonic Band. Russell Schmidt (Valley Jazz Cooperative) will be the clinician for the Jazz Ensemble. Dr. Caroline Beatty from Texas State University will be the Concert Band clinician. The Concert Band will premier the winner of the 2022 ATSSB Composition Competition which also receives a \$1500 award.

We are looking forward to seeing the students and directors in Melissa for the All-State Jazz Band rehearsals and concert. If you are a director of an all-state jazz student, be sure they have their music printed out for the rehearsals and any other items needed, such as mutes, sticks and mallets. Between visiting the clinic sessions, be sure to

spend some time in the jazz band rehearsals as Dr. Mo Trout, Purdue University, leads the band through its practices.

Looking ahead to jazz auditions in 2021-2022, the music for Set A is available from Buddy Mattei, and the link to purchase the music is on the www.atssb.org/jazz page.

The auditions for region jazz band happen relatively early in the school year, so encourage other directors in your region to have their students tryout and enter the all-state process. Having a seated performing region band is not a requirement for students qualifying for area or earning a chair in the all-state jazz band! If your region does not have a region jazz band, and you have students who are interested in auditioning, contact your region coordinator to see how to enter and progress through the process.



Proposed Constitutional Amendment
Separate Class 1A/2A Representative into Two Offices - July, 2021

Amend Article V of the Constitution from:

SECTION 4. AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVES. One representative from each Class (1C, 2C, 1A/2A, 3A, and 4A) shall assume office in the manner prescribed in the By-Laws. Each of the five representatives shall be voting members of the State Board of Directors.

To:

SECTION 4. AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVES. One representative from each Class (1C, 2C/3C, 1A/2A, 1A, 2A, 3A, and 4A) shall assume office in the manner prescribed in the By-Laws. Each of the six five-representatives shall be voting members of the State Board of Directors.

Amend Article II of the By-Laws from:

SECTION 4.(a). DUTIES OF THE AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVES. Each of the five At-Large Representatives (one from Class 1C, one from Class 1A/2A, one from Class 1A/2A, one from Class 3A, and one from Class 4A) shall serve as voting members of the State Board of Directors so as to maintain a balance of opinion among the different classes of schools.

To:

SECTION 4.(a). DUTIES OF THE AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVES. Each of the six five-At-Large Representatives (one from Class 1C, one from Class 1C/2A, one from Class 1A, one from Class 1A) and one from Class 1A/2A happens as voting members of the State Board of Directors so as to maintain a balance of opinion among the different classes of schools.

Amend Article II of the By-Laws from:

SECTION 4.(a). DUTIES OF THE AT-LARGE REPRESENTATIVES. Each of the six five-At-Large Representatives (one from Class 1A), and one from Class 1A/2A happens as voting members of the State Board of Directors so as to maintain a balance of opinion among the different classes of schools.

Amend Article II of the By-Laws from:

SECTION 4.(b). NOMINATION. At the Spring or Fall Region Meeting of odd years, each Region may submit one name for the office of Class 1C Representative and one name for Class 4A Representative to be nominated for election at the forthocoming Clinic-Convention. At the Spring or Fall

one name for 3A Representative to be nominated for election at the forthcoming Clinic/Convention. The presiding officer of each Region shall file the name of the candidate with the Executive Secretary. The Executive Secretary shall notify each candidate of their nomination. If the nominated candidate does not accept the nomination by December 1 by submitting a biography and picture for the December Newsletter, the name(s) will be deleted from the list of candidates. Nominations for the office may be made from the Iloor.

Amend Article II of the By-Laws from:

SECTION 4.(d). ELECTION. The general membership of ATSSB Executive Committee on At-Large Representatives. If there is no clear majority, the winner is the candidate with the most votes, provided the runner-up has a shortfall from 50% that is at least double that of the leading candidate; if there is no such candidate, then a secret ballot will be cast between the top two with the individual receiving a simple majority of the total votes cast being declared the winner. Support for a 1A Representative


I have enjoyed serving as the representative for both 1A and 2A during the last one and half years, and I would have no problem continuing to serve both classifications. I have actually enjoyed getting to know and speak with several directors over the last several years in both classifications, and I have enjoyed fighting for the concerns of ATSSB's smallest schools.

Nevertheless, I feel as though it is time for there to be a separate 1A representative. Not only do I personally believe that 1A should have its own representative, but many of the 1A directors have expressed this in feedback on survey's I have sent out over the last couple of years. First off, 1A directors and band programs should have a representative that comes from and works in 1A schools. These 1A directors understand the uniquely different problems and concerns that happen within the walls of 1A schools.

Secondly, we should be continuing to help empower and grow the band programs in the 1A classification by giving them more opportunities to be represented at the state level. In the last several years, the 1A classification has been given its own state marching band contest which has encouraged 1A schools across the state to funnel resources towards rebuilding and/or restarting their band programs. Providing a 1A representative a seat at the table as a part of the ATSSB Executive Council and State Board would be another way of legitimizing 1A band programs in the eyes of school administrators and state officials.

Lastly, there is simply no need to limit or combine representation for the 1A and 2A classifications, especially if there are a significant amount of member schools in both classifications. It will not hurt the organization overall to have additional representation from our smallest classification present (and with voting privileges) at the Executive Council meetings and State Board meetings. Additional collaboration and input from a variety of diverse sources will only help us come to a better consensus.

Ultimately, adding a 1A representative will better serve the 1A classification, help continue to empower 1A directors and band programs, and make our overall organization stronger. Please consider voting "Yes" to the proposed amendment to the ATSSB Constitution splitting the 1A/2A representative position into separate 1A and 2A representative positions.



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
