EXECUTIVE SECRETARY COLUMN

Your membership expires on July 31 so if you plan to enter students into jazz auditions which are always early, be sure to join for 2023-24 as soon as you can to avoid errors while entering students. If you are not yet a member for next year, fill out the application online:

https://www.atssb.org/atssb-membership-application-form/

You need only list name and school and any changes - we already have the other posted data in the database. Then send payment when your school budget year begins - or go ahead and send in the check or school Purchase Order now while you are thinking about it. Dues for Active Members are \$50, but remember that after October 1, the dues increase to \$75 unless you are joining as an Associate Member or College Division Member (everything is the same, you just cannot run for office, vote, or enter students in any ATSSB competition). Retirees who retire as an Active Member retain their Active Membership, but dues are reduced to \$25 per year. A cover page showing your ATSSB and TMEA membership card must be sent with the initial entry forms for the first audition entered (ATSSB or TMEA). Don't forget that if you enter students in the Jazz Ensemble competitions that audition deadlines are EARLY, so get your ATSSB and TMEA dues taken care of as soon as possible. I email a copy of your card as soon as I receive payment of dues, so be sure we have an accurate email address for you and that your school does not block mail from this office (attachments trigger spam guards, so make sure we are allowed). While you are at it, go ahead and join TBA for July.

If you are new to ATSSB, be sure to check out our secure website (<u>https://www.atssb.org</u>).If you are having difficulty finding forms or data you need, you can always check out the link at the top of the home page "ATSSB A-Z" which can help you find what you are looking for. Also let us know if any links are not working so we can keep this trove of data up to date.

In your fall region meetings, you need to nominate a Class 2C Representative, a Class 2A Representative, and a Class 4A Representative to the State Board of Directors. An electronic ballot will be cast in January if an office has more than two candidates to reduce the final ballot to no more than two candidates per office. The election will be held at the General Session tentatively scheduled for Friday, February 11, 2024, at 1:00 p.m.

This coming year, Dr. Michael Golemo (Iowa State University) will be the clinician for the Symphonic Band. William Owens (Composer and Retired Educator)) will be the Concert Band clinician. The Concert Band will premier a piece by William Owens commissioned by ATSSB. Noe Marmolejo (University of Houston) will be the clinician for the Jazz Ensemble. The Jazz Ensemble will premier a piece by Aaron Lington commissioned by ATSSB.

TBA has decided to not have clinicians present clinics on the audition etudes this year. We are looking into having videos made of clinicians explaining and demonstrating the etudes, but this is a huge undertaking on our part. Please give us time to get it organized and on our website. There are numerous commercial audios and videos available for purchase.Jordan Sound Productions (JordanSP@aol.com) sells audio files, and Dallas Winds sells a complete audition year of videos (121 videos) for \$110 (https://dallaswinds.org/atssb/).There may be other options for audio or video files of the Year C offered, but please look for an official affiliation with ATSSB before using them. We have had numerous issues with universities that do not become official ATSSB Licensees who take liberties with the editions, altering excerpts beyond what is allowed by the Prescribed Audition List. STATE JAZZ COORDINATOR COLUMN

Happy summer to everyone!

The auditions for region jazz bands happen early in the school year, so here are some strategies to help your students prepare.

1 – Acquire the Set C music for the 2023-2024 auditions. The music is available for purchase from <u>www.matteimusicservices.com</u>

2 – Deliver the music and the backing tracks to your students.

3 – Find out your region's entry deadline and audition date. Note, your region does not have to have a performing region band for students to advance to Area and State. We have had students in the All-State Jazz Band who came from regions without a performing group.

4 – Familiarize yourself with the music. The four pieces are written so students can practice alone, with a few students, or with a full band. The music is great for small schools, especially those with just one director.

5 – Also familiarize yourself with the rules. There is no vibraphone audition, no usage of valve trombones or electronic drumsets or flugelhorn, etc. When in doubt, ask your region coordinator or send me a note. Region coordinators:



The backing tracks for Area recordings will be made available to the region coordinators in July. As in past years, the tracks will be available behind a password protected page on the atssb.org/jazz page.

OUTSTANDING PERFORMANCE SERIES

What a privilege it is to get to host the Outstanding Performance Series competition once again this summer! As expected, the number of competing organizations and the number of entries has grown yet again. This season, 320 performing ensembles (up from 290) submitted a total of 878 audio files for adjudication (up from 781)!

Adjudication has been postponed slightly, due to a substantial glitch in DropBox. As of last Saturday (5/27), approximately half of the audio files were not able to be located in the DropBox folders. When transferring the files into specified region folders, some of the audio files went 'walkabout' and DropBox declared them deleted. Thankfully, with the help of our webmaster guru, Marc Nichelson, we were able to locate where the audio files had been relegated and restored them to the DropBox folders where they belonged. As of the writing of this article on Wednesday, May 31, ALL files have been fully restored and are ready to be adjudicated! The original June 10th adjudication deadline for Region-level contests should be able to be met, though.



Continue to refer to the OPS Webpage as your primary source of information for the current Outstanding Performance Series season. All adjudication deadlines and certification of advancement dates are listed there. A matrix of all adjudications can also be found to show what regions are judging your entries. A Certification of Advancement form will be emailed by the OPS State Chair following each level of adjudication to show which entries advanced from region to area and then to the state OPS contest, and will also be available to view on the OPS Webpage.

Should you get a call from this number, 903-390-3271, during the summer, be sure to respond, as I may have questions regarding your entries or may be calling to hire you as a judge for the state-level contest at TBA.
