### **Greetings from ATSSB!**

ATSSB enjoyed another exciting and productive year in 2021-22. It was evident from the number of members we had in our thirty-first year (1302, up from 1247 in the previous year) and from the quality of the 2022 ATSSB All-State Bands that our organization has maintained our original goal to be "sensitive to the needs and interests of small school band programs in Texas." Most small schools in Texas that have band programs are participating members of the Association.

The All-State Band Clinic was a positive one. Dr. Caroline Beatty from Texas State University led the Concert Band, premiering **RISING** by Cliff Jones (commissioned by ATSSB for this performance). Dr. Emily Threinen from the University of Minnesota led the Symphonic Band, premiering **THE ESSENCE OF MEMORY** by BJ Brooks (commissioned by ATSSB in honor and memory of Darin K. Johns). Russell Schmidt from the Valley Jazz Cooperative in Phoenix, Arizona, led the Jazz Ensemble.

We invite you to join ATSSB and hope that we can help you achieve your goals this year. You can download the application from the ATSSB website (https://www.atssb.org/files/execsec/App.pdf). You can also open the application online and enter your data using your computer before printing it. Or you can use the online application process to join and use your credit card to pay dues (https://www.atssb.org/atssb-membership-application-form/). A membership card and receipt will be emailed to you and your name added to the roster of your ATSSB Region Coordinator so you can be kept up to date on ATSSB activities. If you wish to have students participate in ATSSB activities this year, you must also become a member of TMEA (http://www.tmea.org) because the two organizations have unified the audition process for membership in Texas All-State Bands.

We hope you will get actively involved in ATSSB - or at least communicate your desires and suggestions to the State Board of Directors through your Region Coordinator (or directly to the Executive Committee).

We start our thirty-second year of service to small-school bands, growing together as unified small-school band directors, and we want you to be a part of it. Thank you for your continued support.

**2022 OPS** What a great comeback from the pandemic for the ATSSB Outstanding Performance Series! OPS State Chair Collin Anderson did a great job organizing the process and overseeing the State Adjudications at TBA. Congratulations to the participants and winners this year. Look for the PDDs (Permanent Digital Downloads) links on the website when they have been mastered.

**ATSSB HALL OF FAME** Initiated at the 30th Anniversary Luncheon during the 2021 ATSSB All-State Clinic in Melissa, members are inducted in February during the ATSSB General Session if selected from nominations received by the previous November 1. See the <u>Hall of Fame Guidelines</u> and <u>Nomination Form</u> online if you would like to nominate someone for this prestigious honor.

**LOST CARD?** If you have misplaced your new ATSSB membership card, you can go online to retrieve it and your receipt. Just go to https://www.atssb.org/membership/ to type in your last name, then the last four digits of your Social Security number. You will get a pdf file of your card and receipt. Should you have any problem accessing it, email me and I will get it to you promptly (atssb@att.net).

**STATE OFFICERS** President-Elect, Class 1C, 1A and 3A Representatives are up for election in February. Nominee biographies will be published online in the December Newsletter and voting will take place at the General Session (tentatively scheduled for Thursday, February 9, 2023, at 3:30 p.m. in Room 220 of the Convention Center. If there are more than two nominees for any office, an electronic ballot will be cast in January to narrow the field to two candidates for the live vote in February. YOu will receive an email notification with a link to cast your vote for the offices with three or more nominees and the top two nominees will be announced in an email to all members prior to the February meeting.

**Want to serve as an ATSSB officer?** Volunteer to help in region band auditions (as a judge, a clinic host, clinic organizer, etc.) and respond positively when asked to run for a region office. Your service will encourage members to nominate you for state office (Class Representative or President-Elect). If you would like to serve in an appointed leadership role (Area Coordinator, OPS State Chair, State Chair Audition Coordinator, State Jazz Coordinator, All-State Band Organizer, etc.), let the President know via email or other contact of your interest in the position. If you would like to be considered for the appointed position of Executive Secretary, notify the President who will inform the Executive Committee of your interest, then when the position is up for review (at TBA in odd years so that will take place in 2023), your name will be submitted to the Executive Committee for consideration. Just so you know, the Executive Committee is charged with this review every two years, but is also charged with replacing the Executive Secretary in case of a vacancy for any reason.

**ONLINE ENTRY** Remember that entries for all-region band auditions (jazz, middle school or high school) must be done online. Go to the TMEA website (www.tmea.org), click on DIVISION, then BAND, then AUDITION ENTRY, then DIRECTOR LOGIN, then follow the prompts. You should end up on your profile page which will also list available competitions in which you are eligible to enter students. If a contest is not listed, contact your Region Coordinator to see why not (or when it will be available). **CAUTION DIRECTORS AND STUDENTS: Read all data regarding entries!**

**AUDITIONS** As you send in entries to ATSSB all-region auditions, remember that students from schools in class 1A, 2A and 3A are auditioning in the 3A Track to All-State and students in class 4A and all color instruments are auditioning in the 4A Track. If you have a class 1A, 2A or 3A student who wishes to take the 4A Track - or any student wishing to take the 5A or 6A track - they **MUST** submit a Track Selection Form with their first audition entry (whether it is to ATSSB or TMEA) - color instruments do not need to submit a Track Selection Form since all color instruments are adjudicated in the 4A Track. Also, please realize that since we are aligned with TMEA regarding auditions, directors will be held accountable regarding the policies and procedures which include an obligation to judge at region and area auditions.

**TMAC** The Texas Music Administrators Conference is an organization of fine arts administrators with a common goal—the continued pursuit of excellence in fine arts education in Texas for all students. As we all know, most small schools do not have a separate Director of Fine Arts but the band director usually functions in that capacity. I am a member of this group so we can stay abreast of activities affecting us across the state. You can join also. Their current focus is to help provide districts with resources as they navigate TIA (Teacher Incentive Allotment). See the great article on this issue by Christina Smith in the June Newsletter.

**TRACK ING** Students advancing to Area will be designated by the Track they selected (4A or 3A). The number allowed to advance in each Track is listed online as "All-State Band Profile". The region auditions determine the Area Candidates from each of the regions in the state. Be sure you are aware of eligibility requirements and that you have taken care of all of the necessary paperwork (ATSSB membership, TMEA membership, region entry fees, forms completed, etc.) in advance of auditions. Please see the updated ATSSB Officers and Organizers in this Newsletter (and keep up with changes online) and contact your Region Coordinator if you have any questions regarding auditions. If you are already a member of ATSSB for 2022-23, your name and address is in your Region Coordinator's database and you will be receiving emails and/or mailouts regarding these auditions.

**JAZZ** This process remains unchanged. The only clarifications are that no mutes are to be used in the improv section of the recorded area auditions. See the current Year B Update online:

**ADDANCING PAST REGION** If you have students who are selected to audition at the ATSSB Area auditions January 7, 2023, be sure to pay the \$25 Area fee to ATSSB (they do not owe this to TMEA) or they will not be allowed to audition at the Area level. All students who audition at Area will receive an Area patch. No forms are necessary at the virtual Area auditions. If you have a student make State, they will receive a link to TMEA from which they will download documentation required for All-State.

**PATCHES** Speaking of patches ..... there has been a proposal to redesign the Area patch, using color and redesigning the shape. The ATSSB Executive Committee is now tasked with receiving design suggestions from the regions (if they express a desire to do so) and/or individual members. If a change is to be made, a change will be made to ALL of the patches ATSSB uses (region/district, area, jazz region, jazz area). Adding color or increasing the size/shape of the patches will increase the cost of the patches (in most cases, almost doubling the cost), so that will be taken into consideration as the Committee comes up with a proposal that will be presented to the membership for approval.

**WEBSITE** Webmaster Marc Nichelson has done a great job managing the new website. It is a treasure trove of information and forms needed for all aspects of the ATSSB audition and competition experience, so check it out and keep track of all updates as they are announced, especially the catch-all page (https://www.atssb.org/executive-secretary/atssb-a-to-z/).

Meeting **called to order** at 7:16 a.m. by Matt Knight.

The **Invocation** was given by Don Summersgill.

The Oath of Office was given by Kenneth Griffin.

**Minutes of the SBOD meeting** February 10, 2022, as printed in the March Newsletter were approved after a motion by Bryce and a second by Anthony Alvarado.

Mr. Knight **suspended the agenda** to allow OPS State Chair Collin Anderson to give his report so he could attend the OPS judges' meeting:

Mr. Anderson reported that the 2022 OPS was active, with 789 entries from 288 different ensembles. He reported that the 1A pilot program separating them from 2A went well, although ¾ of them came from one area, causing the Executive Committee to allow all region winners to advance to the State OPS Finals. Another issue under current study is the possibility of having a separate non-varsity category for high school and middle school but that would depend on the number of entries and the availability of adjudication rooms at TBA.

Under the reports of Special Committees:

Mr. Knight introduced UIL Assistant Music Director Gabe Musella who gave a **UIL report**:

He thanked the Board for the invitation to attend on behalf of himself and Dr. Kent.

UIL activities for 2022-23 will be as pre-pandemic with exceptions noted on the UIL website.

House Bill 547 set a policy that non-enrolled students may participate in public school activities if adopted by the individual ISD.

The sightreading pilot program in regions 6, 13,15,25, and 26 will be expanded next year to any region wishing to use the procedure.

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There are many more options in the PML which will go online September 1 with 150 additions to the solo-ensemble lists along with additions in all levels of band.

He encouraged participation in the UIL Chamber Music competition.

The State Marching Contest will be for 2A, 4A and 6A with the superintendents being polled to have all conferences each year at the State Marching Contest.

Check the UIL website for the physical requirements and timelines, hours allowed in summer marching practices.

A new rule allows a non-participating student to intervene to repair electronic failures during the performance. Also, electronic cable may cross the sidelines so long as students do not cross them during the performance.

#### The Website Report was given by Marc Nichelson:

He asked Regions to keep their pages updated and to make sure each page of the individual region's site is titled with the name of that region.

#### Jim Jones gave a NAMMB Report:

He invited all to attend the NAMMB meeting that morning and outlined the coming contests for NAMMB at the pre-UIL, area and state levels with state being held at Baylor November 1.

#### **Heard reports of Standing Committees:**

President-Elect and **SARC** Chair Rodney Bennett had no report.

Eric Gray reported that the Past-President Committee had no report.

Matt Knight gave the **State Jazz Coordinator** report for Brian Donnell who was unable to attend. He noted that this is Year B and that the music could be obtained from Mattei Music Services – and that if you already had the set from five years ago it was all still good. Steve Owen from the University of Oregon is going to be the clinician and ATSSB has commission him to write a jazz piece for the ensemble. The Area Jazz adjudications are posted on the ATSSB jazz page: Region 23 = alto sax, Region 2 = tenor and bari sax, Region 13 = trumpet, Region 10 – tenor trombone, Region 3 = bass trombone, Region 5 = rhythm, and Region 16 = drums.

#### **President's Report** by Matt Knight:

He thanked everyone for being there and for their service to ATSSB. He also thanked Collin Anderson for his great work with the Outstanding Performance Series.

He announced the clinicians for coming years:

2023 BJ Brooks from West Texas A&M University- Concert Band

David Allen Waybright from the University of Florida - Symphonic Band

He thanked the Executive Committee for their service and the many hours they spend on discussions and decisions for ATSSB.

He thanked Kenneth Griffin for his service to a round of applause from those in attendance.

#### **Executive Secretary's Report** by Kenneth Griffin:

Apologized for leaving ribbons at the ATSSB table in the Exhibit Area and told them to come by the

table to get them when they could.

Gave a **Scholarship Report** which showed a value of \$194,177.67 as of June 1, 2022, noting that ATSSB awarded 24 \$500 Scholarships and 12 \$2000 Scholarships this year, and that \$449,500 had been awarded to 531 individuals since 1997. Noted that the **Kenner Scholarship Fund** was valued at \$13,218.00 as of June 1, 2022, and that 8 \$1000 scholarships had been awarded in the last 8 years. The **Program Fund** was valued at \$21,667.36 as of June 1, 2022, and that dividends from that fund have consistently paid for all-state programs since the fund was started with a donation from the Elmer and Anita Family Trust. Noted that the **Commission Fund** was valued at \$31,593.32. He noted that Regions 2,3,6,8,10,12,15, and 22 have Region Rules on file but the rest will not have access to the audition entry process until they submit their updated rules. He gave out a patch order form for the year. He noted that Region 11 had suggested having a different area patch but that was referred to the Executive Committee.

There was no old business.

#### Under new business:

Region 15 moved, and David Balkema seconded that ATSSB add an All-State Percussion Ensemble mirroring TMEA in the process and numbers selected. After a short discussion, the vote passed unanimously. Mr. Knight noted that TMEA would have to approve it since the Alignment Agreement specified the procedure.

Brian Sours moved and Joe Walker seconded that ATSSB follow the TMEA procedure of selecting chair placement using a recording of the area audition material in the week following area. After a long discussion, the question was called, and a vote taken. The motion failed.

Reporting about Licensees, Mr. Griffin noted that 18 ACTIVE Licensees have paid \$277,176.23 into the Scholarship Fund beginning in 1997. That fund has expended \$449,500 since then due in part from donations from regions and individuals and that blessed late fee for dues! We also have done very well in our brokerage accounts over that span of time. He asked that regions take care that vendors at their events are official Licensees.

Regarding Fall Region Agenda items, Brian Sours made the motion to approve the agenda (attached). After a second by Jim Jones, the motion passed.

Bryce Victory moved and Jim Jones seconded that the time and place of the **General Session** is to be set for 2:15 p.m. on Friday, July 22, 2022, in CC213. Motion passed.

Kenneth Griffin moved that the bid from Probst Audio to record the 2023 concerts. After a second by John Pritchett, the motion passed.

#### **Minutes of the February ATSSB General Session**

The General Session of ATSSB met in CC213 on Friday, July 22, 2022, with approximately 210 in attendance. President Matt Knight called the meeting to order at 2:15 p.m.

Rusty Baldwin from Sonora gave the invocation.

Mr. Knight introduced the head table: himself, Executive Secretary Kenneth Griffin, President-Elect Rodney Bennett, Class 4A Representative Marc Nichelson, Class 1A Representative Brian Tillman, Class 2A Representative Brian Sours, Class 1C Representative Gina Muela, 3A Representative Bonnie Anderson, Class 2C/3C Representative Christina Smith, and Immediate Past-President Eric Gray.

The minutes of the General Session February 11, 2022, were approved as printed in the March Newsletter after a motion by Kyle White from Grand Saline and a second by Adrian Alonso from Palestine.

Reports from Standing Committees:

Rodney Bennett, President-Elect and SARC Chair, had no report.

Immediate Past-President Eric Gray had no report from the Past-President Committee.

Brian Donnell, State Jazz Chair, could not attend but Matt Knight noted that this is Year B and that the music could be obtained from Mattei Music Services – and that if you already had the set from five years ago it was all still good. Steve Owen from the University of Oregon is going to be the clinician and ATSSB has commission him to write a jazz piece for the ensemble. The Area Jazz adjudications are posted on the ATSSB jazz page: Region 23 = alto sax, Region 2 = tenor and bari sax, Region 13 = trumpet, Region 10 – tenor trombone, Region 3 = bass trombone, Region 5 = rhythm, and Region 16 = drums.

OPS State Chair Collin Anderson announced the 2022 OPS winners and runners-up, noting there were 789 entries this year from 288 performing ensembles. He reported that the 1A pilot program separating them from 2A went well, although ¾ of them came from one area, causing the Executive Committee to allow all region winners to advance to the State OPS Finals. Another issue under current study is the possibility of having a separate non-varsity category for high school and middle school but that would depend on the number of entries and the availability of adjudication rooms at TBA. He then read the list of 2022 OPS Winners and Runners-up.

In the President's Report, Mr. Knight thanked the officers, region and area coordinators and all who served ATSSB this year for their service.

He announced that the State Board had accepted the bid of Probst Audio to record the 2023 ATSSB All-State concerts.

With region jazz auditions fast approaching, I thought I'd offer a few helpful tips.

- 1 Even though one of the demo recordings uses flugelhorn, nobody should play flugel at the area recordings for all-state.
- 2 No electronic drums, no valve trombones, no trumpet mutes, no electronic wind instruments allowed either
- 3 The improv selection is a great way to introduce improvisation to younger students, and utilizing other scales and different modes will challenge the more advanced players. Oftentimes, the all-state clinician will begin the first rehearsal with a Bb or F blues tune just to see where the players are with their soloing skills. Listen to the demo recordings for ideas, as well as searching for examples on YouTube, like Dr. Andrew Allen from Midwestern State who has a series of videos for Set B that are helpful.
- 4 encourage your students to audition!
